# Mercer's Musings

## Saying "Good-bye" is never easy...

This is really bizarre—sitting down to write my last musing. As you may know, I will be retiring after 40 plus years at the Silver Lake Nature Center. I will miss it! But, it is time. The organization is in very good hands with a strong, competent staff and a strong, skilled, concerned, and dedicated Board. I realize that this should be a time to reflect on all that has transpired, but how does one squeeze forty years into a couple paragraphs?

If I had to pick the best part about working at the Silver Lake Nature Center, I would say the people. Now the old man of the profession, when I started, I was a true neophyte—raw, inexperienced, and enthused. Starting the first day, each person who came in, from the kids who visited (some of whom are still around), to the volunteers and the community leaders, helped me to learn and grow into the position. I am tempted to name people, but I know that I will forget someone very important and dear to me in the list that would extend to the end of the page and beyond, so I won't. Instead, I will use positions and those people can figure out who they are.

I have been blessed with a wonderful, dedicated staff. Each has his or her own approach, but each contributed to the growth of the Center through new programs, new ideas, fundraising, friend building, and hard work. Most found the Center a comfortable and enjoyable place to work (most of the time). Through staff efforts, we built buildings, trails, programs, friends, security, and a solid business that served and engaged the community. I feel comfortable leaving the organization in the staff's hands.

The volunteers brought so many skills to the Center. I considered many of them good friends and mentors. I can rattle off a long list of life experiences and lessons learned from the many volunteers who worked on the grounds, the buildings, in the store, and on committees. Each of those lessons became part of my toolbox of skills. Often I have

channeled the memory of a volunteer or staff person as I approached a new or challenging task.

Among those volunteers has been a constant parade of skilled, concerned and talented board members. These people work behind the scene helping to set the direction and tone for the Center. They work on committees, advocate for the Center, make tough decisions, and bring in support from contacts and resources I could never approach. They held my feet to the fire when the organization needed strong direction and unpopular action, and they let me go when my crazy visions would go in new directions.

Early in my career, I dealt directly with the children and teachers visiting the Center. Oh how I enjoyed the light in a child's face when they learned something or the reward of a teacher coming back year after year because his or her children needed the lessons taught in the program. Amazingly, on a rare occasion one of those children will stop by, often with either their children or grandchildren, and reminisce about their experience. As my role changed to more management, I hired people to do the fun stuff, but took great pride in watching the hordes of kids enjoy programs.

I could not give up my role of working with adults—leading trips and doing programs. The fun of finding something new, to going somewhere different, and the many hours of great company with people who pushed me to improve my knowledge and skill levels, can never be replaced. The same could be said about the people in the community who invited me to be engaged in programs and committees.

Undoubtedly, more than anything I will miss the people the most! If you saw yourself in any of the above, I most likely was thinking about one of our experiences, so to you I say, thank you! It has been great!

# The Environment

## Keeping an Eye on Our Local Waterways

Three years ago, the Nature Center was granted funding from DEP through the Coastal Resources Management Program to begin a volunteer water monitoring program. It was the beginning of something meaningful and marvelous.

With the help of trained and dedicated volunteers, we monitor the streams that drain into the Delaware River – the source of our drinking water. We've made many discoveries, good and not so good, about our Silver Lake watershed. One of the first discoveries was that the waters aren't as bad as we expected. Our local waters support a vast diversity of wildlife – flora and fauna. Recent surveys bear this out.

Other research led to discoveries of a different nature. Broken water mains, sewage and oil leaks, fish kills and impacts from construction. None of these incidents were in-

tentional and most had gone undetected because no one was watching. Now we watch, and because of this, problems get noticed and action can be taken.

In all of these cases, government agencies responded once they were notified. It is heartening to know that the Department of Environmental Protection, our local Health Department, PA Fish and Boat Commission and other organizations are there when we need them. But they can't be everywhere and that's where our water monitors come in. They are out there once a month – every month – taking samples, testing, and noting changes. They've done a remarkably good job.

We are now expanding the program within the Coastal Plain. If you have a few hours a month and would like to join us, you can be part of the expansion of a program that keeps an eye out for this very precious resource – WATER.



## The Earthship Education Center Opens

Silver Lake Nature Center has launched a new era of education! The first public building of its kind has opened its doors to provide learning experiences for a variety of environmental issues with a focus on sustainability, conservation, and regeneration in a changing world.


